# PROJECT CLOSING REPORT - Buxton in Bloomin' Winter

# 1. OVERVIEW

The plan was to decorate the town for the winter season, using greenery and home-made decorations, incorporating a Christmas Carnival Parade on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December.

## 2. DETAIL OF WHAT TOOK PLACE

We drew up a list of locations around town that could be decorated - prominent railings, town entrances, lampposts and trees - and posted it on the website. The link was shared with businesses and community organisations and other groups, so they could 'adopt a spot'. Businesses were encouraged to decorate their premises or something close by, and a number did so. We also understand that Trevor Zoppi fixed up more Christmas trees than in previous years, as a result of our encouragement.

To provide some sense of continuity through the town, we produced a set of 'how to' sheets for making snowbirds, red ribbons, poinsettias, crackers and the like. Again, these were posted on the website. We tested the designs at the October Ideas & Action meeting, we also ran several workshops where people could join in making materials. We arranged with the council to add red bows to their Christmas trees when they were put up on 16<sup>th</sup> November. Most of the rest of the decorating was done by the various groups involved on the morning of Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December and the preceding week.

A Christmas Carnival Parade took place from 4pm on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December, going through Spring Gardens, the Slopes, the Market Place and the Pavilion Gardens. There was a Peter Pan theme and lots of people dressed up. The procession incorporated the Buxton Sparkles willow lanterns, as and we were joined by the Kaleidoscope Choir and some of the Rotary Club Singing Santas. The parade stopped at key points along the way for people to sing a seasonal song. In the Gardens, the Peak Paddlers were illuminated on the lake and Buxton Sparkles had installed illuminated sculptures. The Pavilion Gardens did not in the event organise any hot food and drink stalls, instead people were directed back to the Christmas market on the Market Place.

Almost all the decorations were taken down as per instructions by Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> January.

Plans for more costly items such as the Welcome to Buxton in Winter banners did not go ahead as no funding was offered for them.

# 3. ASSESSMENT AGAINST AIMS AND SUCCESS CRITERIA

The aim of the project was to:

- · to brighten up the town for the winter
- to involve the a range of community groups in a project throughout the town
- to encourage a sense of pride, ownership and responsibility for the town
- to raise the profile of Buxton Town Team and recruit new members

and to engage a wide sector of the community in taking responsibility for doing this.

We believe that all these aims were met.

The measurable success criteria of the project were as follows:

## 1. The project is delivered on time and within budget

Achieved - the vast majority of the decorations were put up by noon on 3<sup>rd</sup> December, and taken down by 7<sup>th</sup> January, as requested. The project costs were covered by a grant from Derbyshire County Council.

2. Key areas of the town (Spring Gardens, Quadrant, Crescent, Market Place, Slopes) are decorated Achieved - of the suggested locations, 39 were adopted and decorated. All the key areas of the town were decorated, in addition there were decorations on Fairfield Rd, the A515 Dukes Drive junction and Burbage. Where railings in the town were not decorated by other groups, Buxton Town Team fixed bunting made by Buxton WI.

# 3. Additional decorations are added to the HPBC Christmas trees

Achieved - all six HPBC trees were covered with red bows. Those that had barriers round also had bunting fixed.

### 4. At least 50% of the summer flowerpot people come out for the winter

Probably not achieved - some were set out, outside business premises, but not as many as 50% of the summer numbers; on the other hand additional flowerpot Santas featured in several of the decorated areas.

# 5. The carnival parade takes place and is well attended

Achieved - around 450 people attended the parade, and it all ran very smoothly.

# 6. A wide range of other community groups take part in the project

Achieved - including Buxton Town Team, 30 groups adopted spots, with in addition a number of businesses decorating their own premises. The parade was organised in conjunction with Buxton Sparkles; Buxton Lions provided the marshals; Peak Paddlers provided a spectacle on the lake; the Kaleidosope Choir and some of the Rotary Club Singing Santas supported the singing; the Kaleidoscope Choir also performed on the Market Place after the parade. A full list of participating groups is given in Appendix 1.

#### 7. We get good, positive media coverage

Achieved - we were featured in Pure Buxton twice; we had several articles in the Buxton Advertiser; High Peak Radio covered the story throughout, including reminders after New Year for people to take the decorations down. All press coverage was very positive.

8. Feedback from participants and the general public is positive, with calls for it to be an annual event Largely achieved - feedback to the project team was almost all positive, comments received by email or via Facebook are listed in Appendix 2. The Facebook posts were shared and liked numerous times. Many groups reported that when they were out fixing decorations, or taking them down, they had passers by commenting favourably and thanking them for doing it. A number of other people however, report that comments made to them about the decorations have been much less complementary, so opinions are divided.

## 4. ANY FURTHER BENEFITS

For safety reasons for the parade, we requested that HPBC ensure the lamps on the Slopes were working, which they have not been for several years. HPBC did eventually locate and repair the fault and the lights are now working; as a bonus the light on top of the Turner memorial has also been repaired. The decorative lights down Spring Gardens were also all working properly this year (the last few years some were unlit).

People in the town, whether they liked the decorations or not, are now thinking about how they want the town to look at Christmas and (hopefully) what they could do about it themselves.

A couple of new organisations contacted us wanting to be involved, they have been added to our data base.

## 5. COSTS

Project expenditure was as follows:

Xmas card leaflet for local businesses
Song sheets for carnival parade
Craft materials (for bunting, bows etc)

The costs were covered by a donations of £500 from the Derbyshire County Council Community Fund, leaving £147.69 in hand for any additional or similar costs that arise.

Separately, Buxton Sparkles incurred some costs that they covered from their own funds.

# 6. LEARNING POINTS FOR THE FUTURE

The use of the website for the list of adoptable spots and the 'how to' sheets worked well - the page was accessed nearly 1,000 times, the pdf instructions over 500 times.

Most decorations stayed attached in spite of windy weather, others though were blown away; emails had to be sent out reminding groups to keep an eye on their decorations and make repairs if necessary.

Consider a standardised laminated notice at each spot to emphasis the community element and make is clear which spots had been decorated for instance by primary school children.

Lost children and vulnerable adults procedures to be reviewed for another time.

A roving mike would have been useful for announcements during the parade.

Liaison with the Pavilion Gardens could have been better; they were appraised of the plans in January 2016, and assured us they would arrange for hot food and drink stalls on the Promenade for the end of the parade; they failed to do so and only let us know very late on when it was too late to make alternative arrangements. This and the parade route to be reviewed for next year.

Liaison with Buxton Opera House so the parade theme coincides with the pantomime would also be useful.
